Vocal Tip

Another good "Daily Vocal Tips" to share:

Are your vocal folds AGILE? To increase agility, try practicing STACCATO exercises. Staccato refers to short notes sharply detached from one another (like "ha / ha / ha"). Regular practice of staccato exercises can help your vocal folds achieve greater flexibility as well as more speed. Remember to keep the neck muscles free and to watch out for extrinsic tension. Once you have worked a lot on staccato, try practicing scales that combine staccato and legato (longer, smoother notes) in variation for some real vocal acrobatics! This kind of practice will translate over to your songs in terms of better precision, accuracy, riffs, and control. So, try some staccato exercises... QUICK!

TESTING 1-2-3-!!

Your chorus and/or quartet has been contacted to do a performance singing in a large room with about 75-100 people present and "yes" there will be a microphone.

Hmmmmm Does that mean that your group will be able to use the microphone for speaking AND singing? Rule number one is to arrive early and test it so that your performance can be exciting and fun.

Almost all microphones used in venues other than professional theatres are designed to pick up sound from directly on top of the microphone versus around the sides of it. This means from a single sound source – one voice or instrument.

The proper technique using this type of microphone is to keep it close to the sound source, but not too close. Hold it vertically so that so that it only blocks your chin and your whole face is clearly visible. If you move your head, remember to move the microphone as well to keep your sound consistent. Your voice

and don't cup it!

will fade away if you move your voice away from the microphone.

Unfortunately, this type of microphone will not be able to pick up the sound of a quartet or chorus. For that you would need to have an omnidirectional mic – one that will pick up sound from all sides of the microphone. Be sure to test the mic before your performance.

A microphone mounted on a podium should be adjusted so that you don't have to slouch or lean into it. Move it up or down so that it's not blocking your face. This is especially important for short people. Unlike handheld mics (even ones on a mic stand), a podium mic should be sensitive enough to pick up your voice even when you are standing up straight and a little further away. It is best to test it before your performance.

The volume and sound quality will change depending on how close or far away from the microphone you are from any microphone. As a general rule, your mouth should be a few inches away from the microphone. If you are too far away, you will not be heard or understood by your audience. It's very important to test the microphone with someone listening.

The MC for your performance should speak with a strong, clear voice. As a general rule, it's better for your voice to be on the louder side than the quieter side. The microphone amplifies the voice itself. It allows you to use your energy and enthusiasm to communicate with your audience.

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




